New Temple Progress

We are delighted to announce that the Town of Flower Mound officially approved our Civil Construction Plans on July 7, 2025 - a major milestone in our temple's journey.

As of June 2025, devotees have pledged \$1.83 million toward the New Temple project, with 35% of the pledged amount already received. We are deeply grateful for this support and encourage all remaining pledges to be fulfilled promptly to maintain momentum as we enter the construction phase.

At the Special General Body Meeting on July 20, attended by 52 devotees—including 36 Founding, Lifetime, and Trustee members - the following resolutions were approved:

1. Approval for Land Development – Estimated at \$1.5M (Passed: 100%)
2. Approval of the Floor Plan (Passed: 100%)
3. Membership Fee Revision – Lifetime: \$5K to \$10K; Trustee: \$25K to \$50K, effective August 18 (Passed: 80%)

We are currently reviewing bids and will soon award the Land Development contract to a qualified contractor with competitive pricing and a strong track record. This phase includes mobilization, site clearing, erosion control, excavation, grading, utility installation, stormwater systems, concrete paving, landscaping, irrigation, signage, and supervision.

Bhoomi Puja (Groundbreaking Ceremony) is scheduled for August 17, 2025. We warmly invite all devotees to join us in this sacred milestone and receive the Lord's blessings.

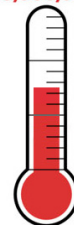

For clarity, Founding, Lifetime, and Trustee memberships are granted based on pledge levels, and membership is awarded upon receipt of the pledged amount and formal approval by the Temple Executive Committee, as outlined in our bylaws.

We are humbled to share that over 225 devotees have pledged to the New Temple, and 60 devotees have already fulfilled their pledges in full.

The Baba Paduka Yatra concluded successfully, with 12 families welcoming Baba into their homes and nearly 1,000 devotees receiving divine blessings. We've received additional requests to host Baba Paduka, and our volunteers are working to accommodate them after the festival season.

We sincerely thank Asha Marla and Meenakshi Gujjarlapudi for their heartfelt participation in the Flower Mound City Council meeting, where they spoke powerfully in support of our temple and community.

We are also pleased to announce that the Civil Site Plan has been officially approved by the Town of Flower Mound a key milestone toward construction.

Preparations are underway for the Bhoomi Puja on August 17, and we are encouraged by the enthusiastic volunteer participation. We invite more devotees to be part of this historic event.

Together, we are building more than a temple we are creating a spiritual legacy.

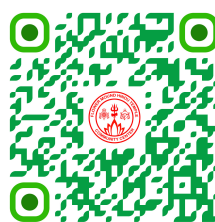

Worship of *Ishta Devata* and *Kula Devata* (Family Deity) is a special tradition to all Hindus. Supporting the rituals to various Deities according to one's choice and ability not only helps in maintaining this tradition, but it is recommended by the scriptures as one's duty. By supporting such activities in the temple, benefits accrue to the masses, and it sets a good example for future generations to follow.

Significant Hindu Festivals in the month of August

Sravana Masam till 23rd August and Bhadrapada Masam Starts on 24th August:

4th August: Second Sravan Sukravaram.

8th August: Sravana Pournima is most auspicious day. Third Friday.

Varalakshmi Vratam: The Varalakshmi Vratam is primarily performed by married women (sumangali), for their own well-being and in order to ask the goddess to bless their husbands with health and longevity.

Rakhi: In the Hindu religion, Rakhsha Bandhan is defined as the safety bond that shows the purity and bonding between siblings. This special Hindu festival occurs on the full moon day, in the month of Shravan, based on the Hindu calendar.

Yajurveda and Rigveda Upakarma: Upakarma, also known as Avani Avittam, is a Vedic ritual observed by Hindus, particularly Brahmins, to mark the beginning of the Vedic academic year and to renew their spiritual commitment. It involves changing the sacred thread (Yagnopaveetham) and performing specific rituals, symbolizing a fresh start in their studies and spiritual practices.

22nd August: Last Friday of Sravana Masam

26th August: Bhadrapada Ganesha (Vinayaka) Chaturthi. Ganesh Navaratri starts.

Sudama Charitra from Bhagavatam

Sudama Charitra is a deeply touching tale of humility, devotion, and divine friendship between Lord Krishna and his poor Brahmin friend Kuchela (Sudama).

Kuchela and Krishna studied together in the ashram of Sage Sandipani. While Krishna was a prince, Kuchela was a poor Brahmin boy, yet their bond was strong and pure.

Years later, Kuchela lived in dire poverty with his wife and children. His wife, seeing their struggles, urged him to visit his old friend Krishna, now the king of Dwaraka, hoping that he might help.

Kuchela was embarrassed to go empty-handed, so he carried a humble gift a small bundle of flattened rice, which Krishna loved in their childhood.

When Kuchela arrived at Krishna's palace, he was received with great affection and honor by Krishna and Rukmini Devi. Krishna washed Kuchela's feet with his own hands and seated him with love, treating him like royalty.

Kuchela hesitated to offer the flattened rice, but Krishna joyfully snatched it and ate a handful, saying it was the most delicious food. Rukmini stopped him before he could eat more, as with just one handful, Krishna had already blessed Kuchela with immense wealth though Kuchela didn't realize it yet.

Kuchela returned home without asking Krishna for anything. To his surprise, his old hut had transformed into a mansion, and his family was adorned with riches and divine grace. He realized that Krishna had quietly given him everything, respecting his humility and selflessness.

What do we learn from the story?

- True friendship knows no bounds of status.
- God sees the heart behind the offering, not its size or value.
- The story exemplifies Bhagavan's compassion and the reward of unwavering faith and highlights the value of bhakti (devotion) over material wealth.

My experiences at Prakriti Dharma Shiksha:

This summer, my family and I attended the Prakriti Dharma Shiksha retreat (which means learning about the natural order and righteous duties) at Lake Mineral Wells State Park for a day. The retreat was meant for us to learn about Hinduism in a meaningful way and have fun.

We started the day with a pooja, followed by a yoga session led by Naveen Gurujii. He taught us breathing exercises (Pranayama) to help calm our minds, and we learnt various techniques to inhale, exhale, and hold the breath in specific ways.

Then, we attempted an hour-long hike on a rocky trail, but the rain cut our adventure short. Luckily, we regrouped in the open auditorium, where I had the opportunity to lead a First Aid session for the younger kids. We discussed what to do in situations like bleeding, choking, or burns and practiced how to stay calm and take action when someone needs help. It was a great way to share something practical and important.

The most important part of the day, though, was our Boudhik (educational discussion) session about Hinduism. We read packets about dharma vs. karma, the six schools of Hindu philosophy, and topics like the significance of wearing a bindi, and the origin of yoga. One discussion I found especially interesting was about how Hinduism is sometimes misunderstood, like people thinking it’s polytheistic. However, we learned there is actually One Divine Truth, Brahman, and all the deities are expressions of that single reality.

To end the day, we enjoyed a fun swim in the lake, and on our way home, we stopped by Spark in the Park in Weatherford, TX to watch the amazing 4th of July fireworks show. It was a fun and educational day that helped us learn more about Hinduism and spend more time with family & friends. Thank you so much to Prasanna Gurujii and Naveen Gurujii for this fantastic experience!

My sister, Dharshana Gokul, has been attending the Sacred Sounds for Young Yogis classes at FMHT for the past two years, which gave our family the opportunity to join the last two summer retreats. In these classes, kids learn slokas, verses from the Bhagavad Gita, and stories from the Ramayana and Mahabharata, while gaining a deeper understanding of Hinduism. It’s a great way to connect with our culture and religion, and more kids should definitely join and take part in the retreats for a meaningful learning experience.

The truth is one; but the wise, talk of many.

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Certain pujas are not conducive to be performed at home on a regular basis (ex. Siva Abhisheka, Lord Balaji Abhisheka) but are easily possible in a temple setting. Our scriptures place an emphasis on doing Pujas for the various deities on important days at the appropriate time (thithis); but due to schedules and other responsibilities, devotees may not be able to personally participate in these activities.

Supporting the worship of your Ishta Devatas on important days during the year has been made easy through the *Annual Puja Sponsorship Program* at FMHtCC. Sponsorship of your favorite deities will ensure that Pujas are done on your behalf on special days regardless of if you are present on that day. These tax-deductible sponsorship donations are at a discount compared to sponsorship of individual programs during the course of the year. Annual sponsorships are valid for one year from the date of sponsorship. Lifetime sponsorships are valid in perpetuity and are deposited into the Flower Mound Hindu Temple Community Center.

You have helped build one of the largest temples in the United States; now consider extending the same generosity to ensure its future. Sponsor an Ishta Deity for a year, or in perpetuity and preserve Dharma today and for the future.

Employer Matching Contributions

Employer contribution matches for religious or charitable organizations typically depend on the specific policies of the employer's matching gift program. Here's an overview of how it usually works:

1. Check Eligibility
 - Employers usually provide a list of eligible organizations or categories, such as religious, educational, or nonprofit organizations. Some employers exclude religious organizations unless the donation is for non-religious activities like community outreach or education.
2. Donation by the Employee
 - The employee makes a personal donation to a qualifying religious or charitable organization, like a Hindu temple.
 - The donation amount should meet the employer's minimum requirements (e.g., \$25).
3. Submit Matching Gift Request
 - The employee submits a matching gift request through the company's platform or by filling out a matching gift form.
 - This could include: The donation receipt.
 - Information about the organization (e.g., tax-exempt status like 501(c)(3) in the U.S.).
 - Some companies use platforms like Benevity or Double the Donation to manage these requests.
4. Employer Verification
 - The employer verifies whether the organization and donation meet their eligibility criteria.
 - If approved, the employer matches the donation, usually up to a specified limit (e.g., \$1,000 annually).
5. Funds Disbursed
 - Once approved, the matching amount is sent directly to the organization by the employer.

Important Considerations

- Tax-Exempt Status: Most employers require the organization to have a recognized charitable status, like 501(c)(3) in the U.S.
- Restrictions on Religious Use: Some employers restrict matching to non-religious purposes, like community services or educational programs offered by the religious organization.
- Annual Caps: Employers often have an annual maximum they will match per employee.

To ensure the temple qualifies and the match is successful, check with your HR or your employer's matching gift policy.

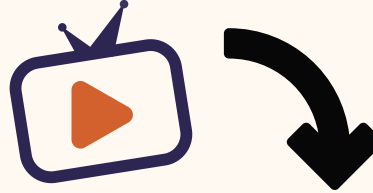

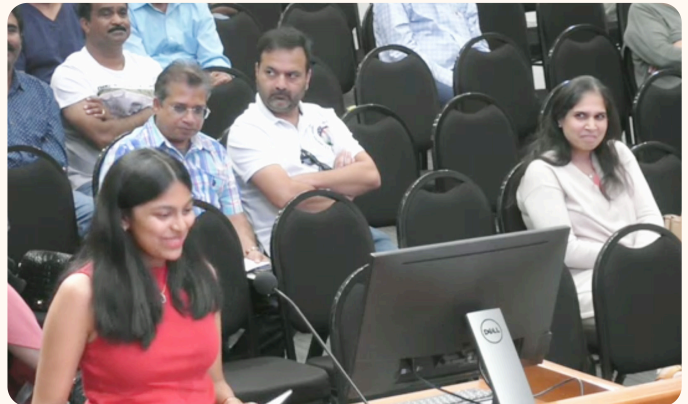

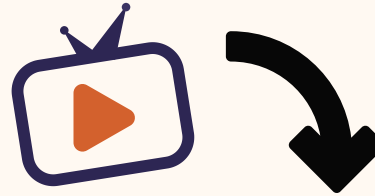

Hindu Architectural Guidelines

- Flower Mound Hindu Temple is seeking architectural exception to allow for flat roof top, instead of slanted roof to support religious guidelines.
- A Hindu temple's architecture is governed by ancient Hindu scriptures, Shilpa Shastra ("science of sculpture") & Vastu Shastra ("science of architecture") with foundation in 4th-century BCE.
- The scriptures provide precise and symbolic guidelines for layout, elevation, and spiritual geometry. It compels structures to possess flat roof.
- The flat roof will have design elements, Vimana, on the top.

Transcript of Asha Marla's Speech

Good evening, Mayor and Council Members. My name is Asha, and I'm a youth volunteer with the Flower Mound Hindu Temple. My address is 4101 Sandra Lynn Drive. Śrī Rāghavendra Swamy – The Kalpavṛkṣa of Kali Yuga



Śrī Rāghavendra Swamy (1595–1671) is one of the most revered saints in the Dvāita Vedānta tradition. His life exemplified perfect harmony between deep scriptural knowledge, unshakable faith, and boundless compassion. As a staunch devotee of Śrī Hari and a disciple in the lineage of Śrī Madhvācārya, he composed over 40 granthas (works), interpreting complex Vedantic principles for both scholars and seekers.

He is best known not only for his scholarship but for the miracles and grace he bestowed upon his devotees. Śrī Rāghavendra Swamy chose to enter Jīva Samādhi at Mantralayam in 1671, assuring his devotees he would continue to protect and bless them for 700 years. He is worshipped as the Kalpavṛkṣa (wish-fulfilling tree) and Kāmadhenu (divine cow) of the age. Countless devotees across generations have experienced his presence, guidance, and intervention in times of distress.

In 2025, his Arādhane Mahotsava (annual commemoration) falls on August 9th, 10th, and 11th, marking the 354th year since his Brindāvana Praveśa. These sacred days are observed through deep remembrance, study of his teachings, and chanting of the famous Śrī Rāghavendra Stotra composed by Śrī Appannācārya.

In the Kali Yuga, when clarity is scarce and doubt prevails, Śrī Rāghavendra remains a guiding light for all who seek refuge in Dharma, Bhakti, and Jñāna.

Bhajatām Kalpavṛkṣāya Namatām Kāmadhenave ||**
