What began as vision and planning has now blossomed into visible on-site construction, bringing our collective dream closer to reality than ever before.

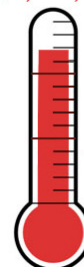

Operational & Puja Committee Update

On February 15, FMHT experienced a significant increase in devotee participation, with about 2,500 devotees visiting the temple on Maha Shivaratri to offer prayers and seek blessings. FMHT also saw a notable rise in youth volunteer involvement in 2026, reflecting the younger generation's growing engagement in temple services and community initiatives.

We are also conducting Rudhrabishekam every Monday and Baba Aarathi Balaji Abhishekam on weekends, which has received a wonderful response from the local Flower Mound residents. We are calling on inspiring individuals to join us as volunteers and be a force for positive change.

How to Prepare: Please prepare Akshantulu by mixing uncooked rice with turmeric powder. You may add a few drops of ghee to help the mixture blend evenly. Ensure that the rice is dry before packing it in a small zip-lock bag or container.

Drop-off Location: Please bring your contributions to our temple. Since the event will take place on Thursday, you can drop off your Akshantulu before 6:30 PM on March 26th, following the regular temple timings.

Support the New Temple Through Stock & DAF Giving

As we continue building our sacred temple, devotees can support this divine effort in a simple and tax-efficient way by donating appreciated stocks or through a Donor-Advised Fund (DAF) often allowing you to give more than cash. Example: Donating Appreciated Stock

Suppose you purchased AAPL (Apple) stock for \$500 several years ago, and today it is worth \$2,500. If you sell the stock first, you may owe capital gains tax on the \$2,000 gain.

If you donate the stock directly:

- The temple receives the full \$2,500 toward construction
- You may avoid capital gains tax on the \$2,000 appreciation
- You may receive a charitable tax deduction for the full \$2,500

This often results in significant tax savings, while maximizing your impact.

- Search for Flower Mound Hindu Temple
- Select AAPL (or TSLA), enter the number of shares, and complete the secure transfer

Using a Donor-Advised Fund (DAF):

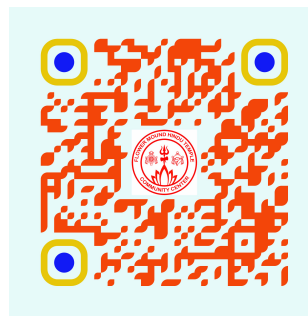
If you have a DAF with Fidelity, Vanguard, or Schwab, you may recommend a grant directly to the temple.

Significant Hindu Festivals in the month of March

3rd Tuesday: Holi

Holi is a major Hindu "Festival of Colors" celebrating the arrival of spring, the triumph of good over evil (specifically the legend of Prahlad and Holika), and the divine love of Radha and Krishna. Observed in March, it signifies a time for renewal, forgiving past grievances, ending conflicts, and strengthening social bonds.

Cultural Significance: It marks the end of winter and the harvest season, often celebrated with bonfires (Holika Dahan) to symbolize the destruction of evil.

Social Harmony: The festival breaks down social barriers, allowing people to come together, regardless of status, to play with colored powders (gulal) and water.

Spiritual Meaning: It promotes love, forgiveness, and the rejuvenation of relationships.

Holi celebrations are expected to bring communities together to embrace joy, color, and new beginnings.

19th Monday: Ugadi, Gudi Padwa, Sri Parabhava Nama Samvatsara(Chaitra Navaratri)

This year is 40th in the 60-year cycle of Telugu years, following Vishavasu. Meaning of Sri Parabhava is "defeat" or "loss". It is often associated with challenges for the unprepared and warns against arrogance. This year's Panchangam covers traditional festivals, tithis, and rasi phalalu.

Key Aspects of Sri Parabhava Nama Samvatsara.

Significance: While the name implies downfall or challenges, it is traditionally interpreted in panchangams as a time requiring careful planning and grounding.

Focus: The year emphasizes astrological, religious, and spiritual observances, including detailed rasi phalalu

26th Thursday: Srirama Navami

Sri Rama Navami is a major Hindu festival celebrating the birth of Lord Rama, the seventh avatar of Vishnu and the epitome of dharma(righteousness). Falling on the ninth day of Chaitra Navratri. It symbolizes the victory of good over evil, encouraging virtues like duty, compassion, and truthfulness.

Key aspects of the importance of Sri Rama Navami:

Celebration of the Ideal Human: Lord Rama is revered as Maryada Purushottam (the ideal man) who upheld moral values and duty even in adversity, serving as a role model for ethical living.

Significance of Dharma: The day reinforces the triumph of Dharma(righteousness) over Adharma (evil) and emphasizes following one's moral duties.

Spiritual Renewal: Devotees celebrate through fasting, singing bhajans (hymns), and reading the Ramayana to cleanse the mind and foster inner light.

Sita Rama Kalyanam: Many temples perform the celestial wedding of Rama and Sita, symbolizing the divine union of virtue and devotion.

The festival also represents the culmination of the nine-day Chaitra Navratri celebrations, marking a time of joy, reflection, and the pursuit of spiritual growth.

The Leadership Qualities of Lord Rama

A Timeless Blueprint for Servant Leadership

The Ramayana is more than just a story of gods and demons. It acts as a guide for how to live. At the core of this guide is Lord Rama, Maryada Purushottama, the Ideal Man. Sage Valmiki did not leave Rama's character to our imagination; he described it in detail, their temperament, speech, conduct, leadership, and values.

What makes Rama's leadership exceptional is that it was grounded in service, not status. Valmiki tells us that after returning from battle, Rama would go to the citizens and ask about their well-being, their families, their sacred fires, their servants, and their students as a father asks after his own children.

He celebrated their festivities and mourned their hardships, just as a father would. He understood people on a deep level. He knew how to wisely decide whom to protect and whom to correct. His anger and mercy were never random; he administered justice based on principles, not impulses. He could rule not just the earth, but the three worlds. Still, Rama's greatest leadership trait was his composure under pressure.

When his coronation was suddenly replaced by exile, he smiled and accepted it without bitterness. When his brother Lakshmana lost his temper, Rama calmed him with humor. When the citizens of Ayodhya followed his chariot into the forest, Rama directed his charioteer to take a different route, not because he didn't want their company, but because he refused to let them suffer on his account. For our youth, these are not just ancient sayings but real, practical qualities: speak kindly first, keep your promises, stay humble, admit your mistakes, and always prioritize the well-being of those you serve over your own comfort.

As Sage Valmiki wrote: "As the sun shines with his rays, Rama was shining with his virtues.

Ugadi/Gudi Padwa - Welcoming a New Beginning

Ugadi marks the New Year for the people of Karnataka, Telangana, and Andhra Pradesh. Maharashtra and Goa celebrate the festival as Gudi Padwa. According to the Hindu calendar, the festival falls on the first day of the Chaitra month (New Moon), considered the start of the Hindu New Year.

To celebrate the new year, many wear new clothes and offer puja. Another common tradition is to eat or drink Ugadi Pachadi, which combines all six flavors sweet, spicy, sour, salty, tangy, and bitter. The essence of Ugadi Pachadi lies in embracing all flavors of life.

Fun Fact: It is believed that if you taste the bitter element first, you may face challenges, and if you taste the sweet part first, the year will bring sweetness and joy.

The festival is celebrated differently in Maharashtra and Goa, where it is called Gudi Padwa. People create a decorated flag, a scarf on a pole, along with other cultural elements. This tradition is believed to ward off evil spirits and bring peace and prosperity to the home.

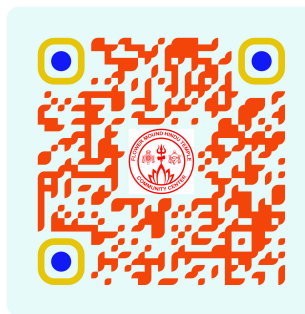

The Annual Puja/Ishta Devata Puja Please scan this QR code

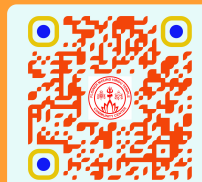


The one God, in His/Her infinite compassion, takes on several forms (Ishta Devata – personal God) to fulfill the needs and aspirations of His/Her devotees. Flower Mound Hindu Temple Community Center was founded on this principle of having several Ishta Devatas to meet the needs of a wide range of devotees. Worship of Ishta Devata and Kula Devata (Family Deity) is a special tradition to all Hindus. Supporting the rituals to various Deities according to one's choice and ability not only helps in maintaining this tradition, but it is recommended by the scriptures as one's duty. By supporting such activities in the temple, benefits accrue to the masses, and it sets a good example for future generations to follow.

Employer Matching Contributions

Employer contribution matches for religious or charitable organizations typically depend on the specific policies of the employer's matching gift program. Here's an overview of how it usually works:

1. Check Eligibility
 - Employers usually provide a list of eligible organizations or categories, such as religious, educational, or nonprofit organizations. Some employers exclude religious organizations unless the donation is for non-religious activities like community outreach or education.
2. Donation by the Employee
 - The employee makes a personal donation to a qualifying religious or charitable organization, like a Hindu temple.
 - The donation amount should meet the employer's minimum requirements (e.g., \$25).
3. Submit Matching Gift Request
 - The employee submits a matching gift request through the company's platform or by filling out a matching gift form.
 - This could include: The donation receipt.
 - Information about the organization (e.g., tax-exempt status like 501(c)(3) in the U.S.).
 - Some companies use platforms like Benevity or Double the Donation to manage these requests.
4. Employer Verification
 - The employer verifies whether the organization and donation meet their eligibility criteria.
 - If approved, the employer matches the donation, usually up to a specified limit (e.g., \$1,000 annually).
5. Funds Disbursed
 - Once approved, the matching amount is sent directly to the organization by the employer.

Important Considerations

- Tax-Exempt Status: Most employers require the organization to have a recognized charitable status, like 501(c)(3) in the U.S.
- Restrictions on Religious Use: Some employers restrict matching to non-religious purposes, like community services or educational programs offered by the religious organization.
- Annual Caps: Employers often have an annual maximum they will match per employee.

To ensure the temple qualifies and the match is successful, check with your HR or your employer's matching gift policy.

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The Cultural Society of Flower Mound is a not-for profit organization run by volunteers to bring the Hindu community together through vibrant cultural events and shared traditions. We provide and support a variety of educational, social, and health-related services and programs. In addition, we plan to provide a library of books on Indian philosophy, religion, arts, culture and spirituality.

Sacred Sounds

The month of February was indeed special for Sacred Sounds for Young Yogis. We successfully completed two-thirds of our annual classroom syllabus, marking significant progress across all groups:

- Bala Upasaka students have now learned 33 out of 50 sloka in this year's syllabus — a strong milestone.
- Bala Sadhaka students completed the learning of yet another cherished stotram — the Sri Hanuman Calisa.
- The Gita Yajña Adhyayi group completed approximately one-third of Daivasura-sampad-vibhaga Yoga (Chapter 16), continuing their steady preparation toward Geeta Jignyasu certification.

Mahasivaratri 2026

The month of February also saw our children enthusiastically participate in the Mahasivaratri 2026 event organized by the Cultural Society of Flower Mound at the Flower Mound Hindu Temple



We had the anugraham of ParamaShiva to begin Maha Shivaratri 2026 with beautiful offerings by sixteen of our children at the Flower Mound Hindu Temple.

The program began with Bala Upasaka – Vishnu Vibhasita, who confidently recited 24 sloka.

This was followed by the Shiva Panchakshari Stotram by Abinandh, Pragya, Sahana, Isha, Dhruva, Diya, Srri Yasha, and Dharshana.

They were joined by Deven, Dhruvan, Gayatri, and Anvika, to recite the Nirvana Shatakam.

The presentation concluded with a vibrant Lingashtakam, where Nishta, Nyra, and Mihir joined the larger group, bringing fifteen voices together for a powerful finale.



Gifts and certificates followed the recitation, and our children received a storybook based on a Hindu Puraṇam, along with their favorite fridge magnet featuring a Hindu Bhagavan. For the first time, they were also presented with a Certificate of Participation from the Cultural Society of Flower Mound.

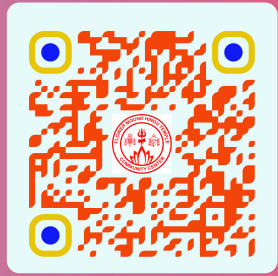
