Building Our New Home: Construction Progress Report

Work at the new temple site is moving forward rapidly to prepare the landscape for major structural work. The engineering and construction teams have completed critical groundwork this past month:

Underground Infrastructure: Completed the installation of all necessary underground conduits. This infrastructure is now ready to support our future irrigation systems, electrical grid, and main water supply lines.

Site Preparation: Tree removal across the designated zones is 100% complete. Heavy machinery is actively grading and leveling the ground to prepare for pouring concrete for the upcoming access roads and visitor parking lots.

Digital Upgrades & Operations Highlights

Our brand-new website officially launched on April 18, 2026. The updated digital platform offers a cleaner interface and streamlined navigation.

Online Puja Sponsorship: Devotees can now securely sponsor regular, weekly, and monthly pujas directly online through our integrated Stripe payment system.

Coming Soon: We are finalizing testing for online new temple construction donation options, allowing you to contribute to the brick-and-mortar fund digitally.

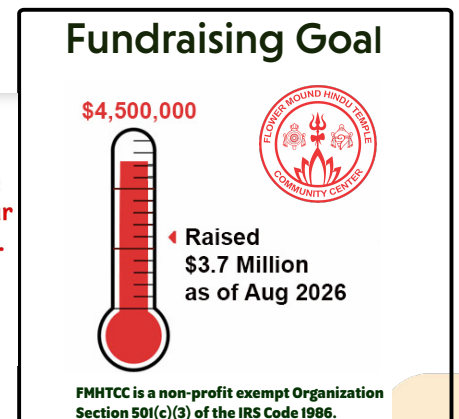
To fully complete the project, we still need an additional \$1 million in new pledges and the timely fulfillment of existing pledges totaling \$3.7 million.

Suppose you purchased AAPL (Apple) stock for \$500 several years ago, and today it is worth \$2,500. If you sell the stock first, you may owe capital gains tax on the \$2,000 gain.

If you donate the stock directly:

The temple receives the full \$2,500 toward construction

You may avoid capital gains tax on the \$2,000 appreciation

You may receive a charitable tax deduction for the full \$2,500

Significant Hindu Festivals in the month of September

4th September, Friday: Last Sravana Sukravaram

9th September, Wednesday: Masa Sivaratri (Pradosham)

10th September, Thursday: Amavasya

11th September, Friday: Bhadrapada Month starts. This month is sunya Masam. Not for celebrations like marriages etc.,

Dual Fortnight Significance: First Half (Shukla Paksha): Dedicated to the worship of deities and the Rishi Ganas (sages), offering a chance to clear divine and sage debts (deva rina and rishi rina). Second Half (Krishna Paksha / Pitru Paksha): Entirely dedicated to honoring ancestors through Shraddha and Tarpan rituals, helping discharge ancestor debts (pitru rina).

12th September, Saturday: Samavedam Upakarma

14th September, Monday: Ganesha Chaturthi, Navaratri for 9 days, celebrating the birth, wisdom, and obstacle-removing grace of Lord Ganesha.

Remover of Obstacles: Lord Ganesha is revered as Vighnaharta, the one who clears hurdles on both material and spiritual paths. New Beginnings: Worshiping him during this period invites success, good fortune, and wisdom before starting new ventures. Spiritual Renewal: The nine nights of prayer allow devotees to meditate on inner growth, balance material and spiritual life, and seek clarity.

Impermanence and Gratitude: The final immersion (Visarjan) symbolizes the cycle of life, reminding followers of the temporary nature of physical forms and returning negative energies back to the cosmic source.

15th September, Tuesday: Rishi Panchami. Is a Hindu observance dedicated to the worship of the Saptarishis (the seven great sages). Devotees express gratitude to the seven ancient sages—Kashyapa, Atri, Bharadwaja, Vishwamitra, Gautama, Jamadagni, and Vashishta—for their spiritual guidance and contribution to humanity.

26th September, Saturday: Pitru Paksham/ Mahalaya Paksham starts. Mahalaya Paksha is a sacred 15-day lunar period in Hinduism dedicated to remembering, honoring, and offering gratitude to our ancestors. Ancestral Visit: People believe that the souls of deceased ancestors leave their realm during this fortnight to visit their living descendants on Earth.

Expressing Gratitude: It is a time to thank past generations for the life, traditions, and knowledge they left behind. Spiritual Peace: Performing sacred rites helps appease the souls of forefathers and grants them peace in the afterlife.

Clearing Karmic Debt: Rituals help remove negative ancestral influences (Pitru Dosha) and clear karmic burdens from the family. 30th Wednesday: September month ends on the 5th day of Mahalaya Paksham

Krishna Janmashtami

In Hindu culture, we celebrate the birth of Lord Krishna, who is an incarnation of Lord Vishnu. This celebration is known as Krishna Janmashtami and honors the birthday of the Hindu god Krishna. According to tradition, Krishna was born at midnight in a prison cell in Mathura to his parents, Devaki and Vasudeva. Devaki's brother, King Kamsa, had been warned that her eighth child would be his undoing, so he imprisoned Devaki and Vasudeva while she was still pregnant. When Krishna was born, Vasudeva safely carried him across the Yamuna River to the village of Gokul. There, Krishna was raised by Yashoda and Nanda, who cared for him as their own son.

Hindus celebrate Krishna's birth as a symbol of good overcoming evil and the return of hope during times of darkness, which is observed on Paksha Ashtami. The celebrations of Krishna Janmashtami involve fasting throughout the day, along with special rituals such as abhishekam at temples, pujas, bhajans, and more, to mark this auspicious occasion. Krishna's favorite foods were makhan kheer and ladoos, so in offering (prasadam), devotees prepare these treats, or temples provide them for distribution in honor of Krishna Janmashtami.

Additionally, a popular event called Dahi Handi involves people forming human pyramids to break a pot filled with yogurt or makhan that is elevated high above the ground. This tradition stems from stories about Krishna's love for butter and his reputation as Makhan Chor, which means "butter thief." As people gather to pray and share prasadam at temples, we are reminded that Krishna Janmashtami teaches us that even in the darkest times, hope can always return.

A Family Affair: Our Ganesha Chaturthi Tradition

Every year, my dad, my brother, and I go to the market to bring Ganesha home. It's honestly one of my favorite parts of the year because the entire car ride back is filled with our excitement. Once we arrive home, my brother and I eagerly compete over who gets to place the coin in Ganesha's belly button. It may sound silly, but it's a big deal for us every year.

After that, we decorate while Paati (grandma) prepares things and Appa (dad) sets up the pooja room. Amma (mom) always tells us the story of how Ganesha was born, and even though I've heard it a hundred times, I still enjoy listening to it. We perform the pooja together and offer a variety of prasadams.

Every year, I also draw my own picture of Ganesha and place it right next to the real idol in the pooja room; it has become a special tradition for me. I help my grandma make kozhukattli, trying different shapes, even though mine never turns out perfect. In the evenings, we walk around to see all the different Ganeshas on each street for three days straight, offering neivedhyam each time. On the last day, we carry Ganesha up to the terrace to perform one final pooja, and then we put him in a tub of water to dissolve. That part always feels a bit strange, kind of sad but also okay at the same time, if that makes sense.

Honestly, Ganesha feels like a friend who visits us every year. He arrives, we celebrate together as a family, and then he reminds us that it's time to start fresh again.

Employer Matching Contributions

Employer contribution matches for religious or charitable organizations typically depend on the specific policies of the employer's matching gift program. Here's an overview of how it usually works:

1. Check Eligibility
 - Employers usually provide a list of eligible organizations or categories, such as religious, educational, or nonprofit organizations. Some employers exclude religious organizations unless the donation is for non-religious activities like community outreach or education.
2. Donation by the Employee
 - The employee makes a personal donation to a qualifying religious or charitable organization, like a Hindu temple.
 - The donation amount should meet the employer's minimum requirements (e.g., \$25).
3. Submit Matching Gift Request
 - The employee submits a matching gift request through the company's platform or by filling out a matching gift form.
 - This could include: The donation receipt.
 - Information about the organization (e.g., tax-exempt status like 501(c)(3) in the U.S.).
 - Some companies use platforms like Benevity or Double the Donation to manage these requests.
4. Employer Verification
 - The employer verifies whether the organization and donation meet their eligibility criteria.
 - If approved, the employer matches the donation, usually up to a specified limit (e.g., \$1,000 annually).
5. Funds Disbursed
 - Once approved, the matching amount is sent directly to the organization by the employer.

Important Considerations

- **Tax-Exempt Status:** Most employers require the organization to have a recognized charitable status, like 501(c)(3) in the U.S.
- **Restrictions on Religious Use:** Some employers restrict matching to non-religious purposes, like community services or educational programs offered by the religious organization.
- **Annual Caps:** Employers often have an annual maximum they will match per employee.

To ensure the temple qualifies and the match is successful, check with your HR or your employer's matching gift policy.
